
EDUCATIONAL OUTCOMES

It's one thing to provide excellent education opportunities, but it's another to inspire students to take advantage of those opportunities. We feel Akili students are equipped and motivated to learn, and the charts below indicate the same!

We are pleased to report that 15 of 17 seniors graduated in June 2024! This compares favorably with Columbus City Schools. The two seniors last year have become fifth year seniors and hope to graduate later this school year.

Students Like Coming to Akili


A much smaller percentage of students are chronically absent at Akili compared to those attending Columbus City high schools, and better than a local suburban high school. See below.

According to Panorama Education, "Chronic absenteeism has profound and far-reaching consequences for students, extending well beyond missed school days. It can hinder the development of critical skills, reduce academic success, and create lasting challenges throughout a student's life."

Furthermore, students from lower socioeconomic status are associated with higher levels of absenteeism. One study shows that low income families are about three times more likely to miss a significant amount of school.² This is not the case at Akili.

District scores were derived from selecting the school district at the top of the web page and averaging the absenteeism rates for each grade level. Lower absentee rates show that students like coming to school.

LIFE COACHING

Students who make progress in their functional lives accelerate their transition into responsible adulthood. Students want to take the next step towards adulthood and Akili wants that for them too! However, students need functional help getting started. To that end, Akili offers Life Coaches to help them launch into adulthood. Coaches can assist students in obtaining a driver's permit, applying for jobs, learning soft skills, and knowing how to buy a used car. Each year about 25 students receive Life Coaching.




